

Monik C. Jiménez, ScD, SM, FAHA, is an Assistant Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School and Associate Epidemiologist in the Department of Medicine at Brigham and Women's Hospital. She received both her master's and doctoral degrees from Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health and a Certificate in Oral Epidemiology from Harvard School of Dental Medicine. Her NIH-funded research focused on understanding the intersection of sex, race/ethnicity and socioeconomic factors in stroke inequities, with a focus on women of color. Additionally, as a 2019 H. Richard Nesson Fellow, she has been funded to examine factors that impact the cardiovascular health of patients who have experienced incarceration, identify ways to support respectful patient-clinician communication about incarceration and inform future policy to support health care equity. In partnership with community advocacy groups, she is the PI of the INdividuals Speak: Incarcerated during the COVID-19 Epidemic (INSIDE) study to examine the lived experience of conditions of confinement experienced by those incarcerated or detained during COVID-19. She is a member of the American Heart Association and is the Immediate Past Chair of the Early Career Committee for the Council on Epidemiology and Prevention. In addition to her research, she works diligently to promote careers in research among students from historically oppressed backgrounds and support their retention across the career trajectory.
